Hakuba Japan Ski Trip Overview

Our club flies out tomorrow to Hakuba, Japan for our first ski trip to that country. We will be staying at the Habuka Nominoki Hotel, right next door to the Hakuba Happo-one Winter Resort.

Our club will definitely ski there but Hakuba is home to ten ski resorts in the Hakuba Valley. It is referred to as the Japanese Alps. While the northern island of Hokkaido is where the really deep pow is, the Hakuba region is the country's most popular ski country. There's no shortage of powder there either

The Happo-one Winter Resort receives 400 to 500 inches of snow per year. It hosted the 1998 Winter Olympics in Nagano Japan

where the alpine skiing, downhill, super giant slalom, and combined slalom events occurred.

It's base elevation is only 2,493 feet above sea level and rises to an elevation of 6,007 feet, for a total vertical drop of 3,514 feet. As ski resorts go, Happo-one is relatively small with only 494 skiable acres and 13 runs. Yes, these aren't the tallest mountains but I know certain members of our club will breathe a whole lot easier as they carene down the mountain.

If the size sounds a bit puny, don't worry. There are an additional 9 ski resorts in the area should

you get bored at Happo-one. All of these resorts are small by Western and European standards, but there are lots of them. Overall, they have over 200 runs in the valley, or as they like to call them— "courses." There are over 2000 skiable acres and 139 lifts. That does not count the extensive backcountry skiing that's available.

Altogether they offer and expansive amount of terrain for all skiing abilities. There is something for

everyone there, from beginners to experts. The place is famous for their powder, tree skiing, and moguls. Apparently, the Japanese love skiing moguls.

Lifts take some getting used to. Seats are lower than those in Europe and the US. Supposedly most trails are pretty easy, but there is plenty of tough stuff available. Slope pitches can exceed 35 degrees. I've read skiers have to take a lesson on navigating these expert runs before gaining access to them.

What makes their snow so good? We like to call it "lake effect" snow, but they call it "ocean effect" snow. Like many ski areas winds blow over evaporating bodies of water, lift up the moisture, and then drop it down wind in the form of snow. We see this in the Pacific Northwest, Utah, and in the Great Lakes of course.

It also happens in Japan. Frigid, dry,

Russian winds blow east and absorb moisture from the Sea of Japan. It's then dumped on the Japanese Alps. The snow has a low water content making it fluffy champagne powder like we see in Utah.

Our crew should find the temperatures relatively pleasant. This time of year day-time highs run in the 20's. I've heard it is generally cloudy.

Our crew going there is going to eat well. This is supposedly one of the best parts of Japanese skiing. Reportedly the food is good just about any place you go, both on and off the slopes. Not only that, prices are pretty reasonable.

History of Skiing in Japan

Eighty percent of Japan is covered by mountains. So it is no wonder this country fell in love with skiing. The only more mountainous countries are probably Austria and Switzerland.

Skiing came to Japan in 1911 by the Austro-Hungarian soldier Major Theodore Edler von Lerch. He came to Japan to assist the Japanese army as an exchange officer. He watched Japanese soldiers trudge through the snow on Mount Hakkoda and suggested they might try skis to get around.

Back then Lerch taught soldiers to use shorter skis and only one long ski pole. Eventually the Japanese adopted the use of two poles within a decade.

The sport first gained popularity in the 1930's when the Japanese government paid another Austrian, Hannes Schneider, to give ski lessons. This was a large scale effort with Schneider at the base of Mt. Fuji giving instruction to thousands of people using a loudspeaker. Schneider was also famous for his three-piece suits, that he always wore, even when he was skiing.

In 1956 Chiharu Igaya won a silver medal in an alpine event, and was this country's first alpine medal in a winter Olympics. To this day, she is the only Japanese alpine Olympian to win a medal.

The Winter Olympics were held in Sapporo, Hokkaido in 1972 and were quite successful. This led to a skiing boom in the country beginning in the 1980's.

Snowboards came on the scene in the 1990's and were not initially welcomed. However, alpine skiing

began to show a decline then. Just as in the USA, resort operators realized that snowboarders had money too and welcomed them to their slopes. Now snowboarding is just as popular as the two plankers.

Snowsports took a plunge in the 2000's. Skier visits dropped from 18.6 million in 1993 to only 13 million in 2005. Problems at the time were due to a national economic down turn and resorts still banned snowboards.

Japan is a winter sports Mecca that hosts international skiing events every year. This includes World

Cup ski jumping, alpine events, Nordic, freestyle, and snowboarding venues.

There are currently about 500 ski hills all around the country. The word has been getting out internationally about the quality of their powder, also referred to as "Japow."

The Hakuba Valley

In ancient times the Hakuba Valley was known for a type of serpentine stone used for making stone axes. Approximately 2,000 years ago people began settling there and growing rice. Community leaders made large tombs for themselves in the area. In about 1200 AD the area fell in the realm of Emperor Shirakawa who built a palace for his daughter. After her death that palace became a temple.

A road passed through the area used to transport salt from the Sea of Japan to Matsumoto for processing. This ancient road still runs parallel to the current train line.

In 1894, Mt. Hakuba was officially named and shortly thereafter a church missionary and mountain climber, Walter Weston climbed it. He later went on to help establish the Japan Alpine Club in 1900.

In 1899 a Japanese naturalist, Reizo Kono, studied the plants and wildlife of the area only to find the mountains contained many rare plants. This caused the area to become nationally known and it

became forbidden to collect any plants from the mountains.

Electricity came to the area in 1919 along with the first motor vehicles. Eventually a trainline was built in 1932.

Shortly after skiing was introduced to Japan, Hakuba was recognized as the place for early skiers and mountaineers to go. Locals acted as mountain guides. Small bed & breakfasts began appearing in the late 1940's. Skiing started becoming popular in Japan after the end of the war and this led to the construction of ski lifts in the early 1950's. Happo-ono was built in 1958. Most of the hotels in the area were built during a skiing craze that swept the country in the 1980's.

This culminated in 1998 when the Winter Olympics were held in Nagano, with many events being hosted by the local Hakuba resorts. Since then, ski bums around the globe have discovered the area with their numbers ever increasing. Over 200,000 foreigners came to ski there last


year. Consequently signs all over the area are printed both in Japanese and English. Our folks won't have any trouble reading the menus and signs. Bon appetite folks for the food and skiing.

Ski Report for 2/6/20

I was riding the lift with a pair of ski patrollers last night and remarked "This is the worst winter I can ever remember." Both patrollers gave a nod and one gave me a high five. The one then proceeded to tell me of how he got soaked in the "r" on Tuesday night.

Once again we had spring conditions last night at Brandywine. All the runs are open except for Grizzly. That run was mostly covered on Saturday and we even skied it. Now it's mostly grass and dirt.

Conditions last night were groomed granular with lots of wet New England powder at the bottom of the hill. Junior, the Great Awesome Weather Com-



puter, tells me to hold fast because conditions will be improving over the next 24 hours.

This past week we saw snow accumulation of 20" or more at Snowbird, UT, Taos, NM, Whistler-Blackcomb, BC, and Lake Louise, AB. However, in preparing the ski report table I noticed a slight but definite reduction in the bases of many ski areas across ski country. Could that be a sign of spring? I hope not yet.


As you can see in the map above, the Northeast, Northern Rockies, and Central Rockies will see significant snow fall tomorrow. Friday and Saturday will be powder days in New England. The other map shows some heavy snow expected in the Pacific Northwest this weekend. Otherwise it looks to be a fairly quiet snow weekend.

As I said above, conditions are looking good for us locally too. We're expecting a wintery mix today that will turn to snow tomorrow. We're looking at getting just a few inches though. Temperatures Friday and Saturday will stay just shy of freezing with night-time snow making lows. We can expect a little snow on Saturday. Sunday warms up a bit to the upper 30's and cloudy. Next week temperatures will stay in the upper 30's with mostly cloudy skies. There's likely to be some snow in those clouds next week too.

Western New York expects "r" today with a high in the upper 30's. That will turn over to snow tonight and tomorrow. Junior isn't expecting much accumulation Friday. Some snow is expected Saturday afternoon with a high of 31. For our ski bus trip on Sunday to Holiday Valley we can expect cloudy skies with a high of 38 and maybe a flake or two in the afternoon.

Holiday Valley has 48 runs open now and conditions should improve a bit this weekend. Unfortunately, I don't expect any of the glade runs to be open. Expect groomed granular conditions, hard pack, and icy spots. This trip will likely be a good time to work on your edge control.

Western Pennsylvania will have a high of 53 today



and drizzle. That too will turn over to snow tonight and tomorrow. Then expected partly cloudy days over the rest of the weekend with temperatures rising from 30 to 38 by Sunday. Then, bad news, they are expecting three days of intermittent "r."


